

Pastor's Musings

Twenty-three years ago all the world seemed to be afraid that the new century would destroy all that we knew. Somehow computers were going to go crazy and destroy bank accounts, airplanes would fall out of the sky and you know the rest. It didn't happen, the ball fell in New York Times Square, fireworks were sent into the sky, and football was well and good. In some sense politicians and the news media are saying the same thing today; the world is falling apart and we are coming to the end of time. The reality is our life will go on in the same way as it did 23 years ago.

In this world of conflicting opinions, personal difficulties and catastrophes around the world, a pastor is called to preach. There are dangers in preaching, not because people will fall asleep. A simple way to understand preaching may be pastoral or prophetic. Pastoral is to care for the hurting, the sinful, to be a comfort and understanding. Prophetic is when you confront the sinfulness, challenge the comfortable, and hope for transformation. Being prophetic is dangerous; a pastor can end up on a cross like Jesus.

Many times I'm not sure if I am preaching God's words or mine. Most weeks in preparation to write my sermon, I connect with other pastors to talk about the lessons for that week. I read commentaries, and most importantly contemplate, or ruminate about them. Sometimes the sermon comes easy, at other times not so much. It is also hard to get feedback if I am making any sense to people. Some people do respond by saying they liked a sermon, but most of the time I get little feedback. My hope is that occasionally you might have a conversation about something I said.

Preaching does require some understanding of who I'm preaching to. It was four years ago that I visited many of you at St. James. I learned a great deal from those visits. I want to visit each of you again. I would especially like to learn the concerns you may have about your own life, about the community, about the country or internationally. My goal is to listen not to dialogue.

I hope this Christmas (since it is still Christmas until January 6th) and new year brings many blessing to all at St. James.



Call to Order: Gene Giltner, President, called the meeting to order.

Pastor Gordon opened the meeting by sharing the history of Christmas.

The **Secretary's Minutes** for the November 8th Council Meeting were presented for approval. John made a motion to approve the minutes. Joyce seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The **Secretary's Minutes** for the December 11th Congregational Meeting were presented for approval. Ivan made a motion to approve the minutes. John seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The **Financial Report** for November was presented. John made a motion to accept the report. Flora seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Gordon reported that he continues to see 4-5 members unable to attend worship. He reported that 23 people attended the Advent Service we had at St. James. He plans to begin tracking attendance going forward. Pastor Gordon also reported that Sherie & Paul Rohal have requested a transfer of their membership to St. James. We will officially welcome them into the congregation in January.

Unfinished Business:

- Homecoming (8/5-6/2023) Anne reported that Open Circle is still collecting names and addresses for the guest list.
- LED Lighting Gene presented an LED light fixture with a "footprint" that
 matches what we currently have, eliminating the need to repaint the ceiling in
 the Fellowship Hall. Gene distributed information comparing pricing at Lowe's,
 Home Depot, and Capital Electric. The best option is Lowe's. Anne will work
 on establishing a Tax-Exempt status in the Lowe's system prior to purchase.

- Oyster Supper & Cake Auction Joyce reported that we made around \$800.
 Money is still coming is as the remaining oysters are being purchased.
