

Pastor's Musings

Last Sunday, the First Sunday in Lent, the Gospel was Jesus in the desert being tempted by the devil. How you understand Jesus being tempted indicates how you see God acting in our lives. Was Jesus tempted just like we are tempted? He was fully human and it was a real struggle after fasting for 40 days. Or was he not affected by the devil's temptation because he was fully God and God has the power?

There is no absolute right answer to this question. Is Jesus fully human or fully God has been debated for centuries. The Nicene Creed in 325 ADE argued about it, Martin Luther in 1500 debated it and today it is still a question. As a chaplain and as a pastor, I have witnessed many people in crisis struggle with this question. Depending on how they understood the answer to this question may help or hinder them in their life.

One answer that helps a lot of people is the affirmation, "They are with Jesus now." However when an aunt said this to her nine year old nephew who was crying when his mother died, he looked at her and said, "I don't want my mother with Jesus, I want her with me."

Some will see and have the understanding that everything happens for a reason, or it is God's will. For many this is a comforting thought. However, in my first congregation when a couple's 12 year old son died they were so angry at God they never came back to church after the funeral. A woman that I visited in the

The Apocrypha is considered a part of Holy Scripture in the Roman Catholic and Orthodox churches, but we know little of it in the Lutheran and other Protestant Churches.

During this Lenten Season, we'll take a look at our Faith Story - "The Story of You"- through the lens of the Apocrypha.

The books of the Apocrypha were written in the period of history between the Old and New Testament. They contain Prayers, Wisdom Literature, Short (and sometimes wild!) Stories, as well as "straight up" History.

We'll discover, during this Lenten Season, that this collection of sacred documents "off the beaten path" can be a strong aid to our own baptismal journeys of faith; "the story of you" on the way to the cross, the tomb, and the resurrection of our Lord!





St. James Lutheran Church Council Meeting February 14, 2023, at 7:00 p.m.

Present: Joyce Dull, Gene Giltner, Anne Putnam, Pastor Putnam, Flora Williams, and John Wright

Absent: Ivan Diehl

Call to Order: Gene Giltner, President, called the meeting to order.

Pastor Gordon opened the meeting with a devotional surrounding "gratefulness". Not only should we be grateful for what we have, we should be grateful for what we don't have – illness, food insecurities, etc. This was followed by a prayer.

The **Minutes** for the January 10th Council Meeting were presented. A motion was made by Flora and seconded by Joyce to approve the minutes. The motion passed.

The **Minutes** for the February 12th Congregational Meeting were presented. A motion was made by John and seconded by Joyce to approve the minutes. The motion passed.

The **Financial Report** for January was presented. A motion was made by John and seconded by Joyce to accept the report. The motion passed.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Gordon reported that the Hogan family will be using the Fellowship Hall on 2/15/2023 for a Celebration of Life of the 5th anniversary of their son's death. He will be in the building as a representative of St. James. He shared a handout describing the theme for this year's services. It also listed the dates and locations of each Wednesday service, noting that there will be a Soup Supper prior to each worship service. Pastor Gordon reported that he continues to see those unable to attend services on a regular monthly basis in addition to other home/hospital visits as needed. He will be contacting Angela of Barren Ridge Vineyard to schedule two summer services. The suggested dates are 7/9 and 8/20 or 8/27.

Correspondence: Each member of the council signed a thank you card to Jeff Flint for the mulching that was recently done around the church.

Unfinished Business:

- Homecoming (8/5-6/2023) Anne reported that "Save the Date" cards were mailed on 2/8. There was discussion regarding a budget for the event. At this point, we will track the expense. Joyce offered a \$500 donation from Social Ministry.

- A motion was made by John to accept the Synod's recommendation to increase the compensation for pulpit supply for rostered ministers to \$200 per service.

- Noting the IRS standard mileage rates for 2023, Joyce made a motion to increase the mileage reimbursement to meet this standard of 65.5 cents per mile. John suggested 66.0 cents for ease in calculating. Flora seconded this amended motion. The motion passed.
- Review/Update of the Constitution and By-Laws was tabled.
