

Pastor's Musings

Anne & I enjoyed a great three-week road trip through the south. We spent time with family, including time with my cousin Rick, whom I had not seen in about 30 years, the wedding of Anne's granddaughter, and our grandchildren in Charlotte. We visited Gatlinburg, San Antonio, Houston, Galveston, New Orleans, Montgomery, Atlanta, and Charlotte. We were intentional about selecting these cities for a variety of reasons. However, it was our interest in civil rights that drew us to Montgomery and Atlanta.

Montgomery is the home of The National Memorial for Peace and Justice and The Legacy Museum. These are our nation's first memorial / museum dedicated to the legacy of enslaved Black people, people terrorized by lynching, and African Americans humiliated by racial segregation. The memorial is constructed of over 800 hanging steel monuments, one for each county (Charlottesville & Nelson County included) in the U.S. where a racial terror lynching took place. Each monument bore the name and date of the victim. For those of you who have been to the Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C., the emotions were very similar – both amazing and awful at the same time.

In Atlanta, we began at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change. Dr. King drew inspiration from both his Christian faith and the peaceful teachings of Mahatma Gandhi. His nonviolent movement in the 1950s and 1960s did much to achieve legal equality for African Americans. He led similar campaigns against poverty and international conflict. His principles that men and women everywhere, regardless of color or creed, are equal members of the human family. Isn't this what Jesus teaches us? We also visited the historic Ebenezer Baptist Church just down the street. It has been restored to reflect the look of the church during the seven years when Dr. King was the co-pastor with his father.

The next day we went to The Carter Center, which was founded by Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter in 1982. Anne & I were both amazed by the numerous programs that they have been actively involved in to alleviate suffering through conflict resolution, advancing democracy and human rights, fighting diseases, improving mental health care, and building hope throughout the world.

The meaning and history behind these museums explain a lot about why I have the beliefs I do. History is extremely important and with a significant number of people in authority trying to limit what can be taught these days, our future can only be hurt.




December 6th at Zion, 13th at Grace, and the 20th at St. James.

St. James Lutheran Church Council Meeting September 19, 2023, at 7:00 p.m.

Call to Order: Gene Giltner, President, called the meeting to order.

Pastor Gordon opened the meeting with a devotion from the ELCA on Matthew 20:1-16. The campus pastor read this passage (the parable of the laborers in the vineyard) to his students before an exam, where many had been in study groups, up all-night cramming, and worrying about taking the exam. At the conclusion, the campus pastor closed the Bible and said, "This reading says that it's all a gift – it's all grace. So you've all made an A on your exam, and you're free to go." Many complained that it was unfair. That's the point, God continues to give us unmerited love. There is something inherently unfair in the whole idea of grace. It's just not fair and thank God it's not!

The **Minutes** for the August 8th Council Meeting were presented. A motion was made by Ivan and seconded by Joyce to approve the minutes. The motion passed.

The **Financial Report** for August was presented. A motion was made by Joyce and seconded by Ivan to accept the report. The motion passed.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Gordon reported that he and Anne had a great vacation.

He reported that the Barren Ridge Vineyard worship service scheduled for 9/24 would be a cappella, as Hannah was unavailable and he was unable to find a substitute.

Pastor Gordon reported that 19 churches (including St. James) participated in the Rise Against Hunger event held at Kate Collins Middle School on Saturday, September 9th. He also told of an experience with the Children's Hunger Fund in San Antonio, resulting in some donations to our own BackPacks Program.

Correspondence: King of Kings Lutheran Church in Oceanside, CA requested that the membership of Paul Rohal and Sherie Whiting-Rohal be transferred to St. James.

Committee Reports:

- Property Committee: Paul gave a thorough report of the numerous items being addressed based on priorities established by the committee.
 - The #1 item is the roof. The administration "schoolhouse" portion of the building roof needs to be replaced. Bids of \$6,800 and \$7,200 have been obtained and more bids are pending.
 - Paul reported that the fire extinguishers have been replaced throughout the building at a cost of \$559. An annual inspection is required.

- There are many other items that are in the works. Please consider volunteering your time (you don't have to be on the committee to help on some of the property issues). Contact John Grove or Paul Rohal and let them know how you can help.
- Stewardship & Finance: Anne reported on the Homecoming Finances. The cost of the event was \$1,614.04. Open Circle contributed \$527.53, Social Ministry contributed \$310.00, Donations received \$240.00, and In-Kind Donations of food equaled \$357.00. Net cost to St. James was \$179.51.
- Social Ministry & Evangelism: Joyce reported that we have 13 kids enrolled in the BackPacks Program.
 - She reported that \$250 was sent to Grace Church for the Rise Against Hunger Program.
 - Joyce has begun the planning for the annual Oyster Dinner. Paul suggested that we increase attendance for the fundraiser by inviting those who attended our recent Homecoming. The Council agreed. Anne volunteered to work on the invitations.
- Worship, Music, & Altar: Ivan, reported that choir practice will resume in October, meeting at Betty Bartley's home.

Unfinished Business:

- Secure the building and make sure the lights are turned off on Sundays after church.
 - September = Ivan
 - October = Joyce
- Discussion regarding picking up shut-ins for attendance at worship has been determined to not be a viable option at this time.
- Anne & Gene volunteered to review / update the Constitution and By-Laws.
