



For the second time in a few short months*, St. James has had one of our own recognized for the OUTSTANDING work that he does! We're talking about Paul Rohal.



St. James Lutheran Church Council Meeting August 8, 2023, at 7:00 p.m.

Council Members Present: Ivan Diehl, Lynda Diehl, Joyce Dull, Anne Putnam, Pastor Putnam, and Paul Rohal

Council Members Absent: Gene Giltner

Visitors Present: None

Call to Order: Ivan Diehl, Vice-President, called the meeting to order.

Pastor Gordon opened the meeting with a devotion from the ELCA on Matthew 14:14, "When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick." Jesus had a great deal of compassion for those in need. The emphasis of the devotion was to look at our own compassion for others, realizing that we all have different ways to express it. The prayer asked Jesus to help us have compassion and to reach out to those in need.

The **Minutes** for the July 12th Council Meeting were presented. A motion was made by Paul and seconded by Lynda to approve the minutes. The motion passed.

The **Financial Report** for July was presented. A motion was made by Lynda and seconded by Joyce to accept the report. The motion passed. After discussion, the council asked Pastor Gordon to meet with John Wright to discuss noted items on the report.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Gordon reported that he continues to visit those members unable to attend worship in person.

He reported that Barren Ridge Vineyard cancelled the 8/20 worship service. He is working to reschedule for 9/24 or 10/1.

Pastor Gordon reported that he and Anne will be on vacation from August 28th through September 17th. Pastor Carl will be leading worship the first three Sundays in September.

Correspondence: Anne shared a note from Pastor Ted & Fran Koehl and an email from Theron White regarding our Homecoming Celebration.

Committee Reports:

- Property Committee: Paul reported that the committee met, and a list has been created to identify property priorities. Debbie Snyder and Joyce Dull are working on replacing the 13 outdated fire extinguishers. Anne made a motion to approve up to \$750 from the property fund for the purchase of rechargeable fire extinguishers. The 3 estimates obtained range from \$550 to \$920. Joyce seconded the motion. The motion passed. Nine smoke detectors and a carbon monoxide detector have been purchased (\$132) and were installed by the fire department. A cover for the carbon monoxide detector is needed. Joyce stated that the fire department recommends a lock box with a key to the church in the event of an emergency. No action was taken. The expense for the brush clearing was \$420.
- Stewardship & Finance: Anne, no report.
- Social Ministry & Evangelism: Joyce reported that we have 11 kids enrolled in the BackPacks Program for the start of the school year.

• Worship, Music, & Altar: Ivan, no report.

Unfinished Business:

- Homecoming (8/5-6/2023) Anne reported that we had 88 in attendance on Saturday and 38 in attendance on Sunday. We received two offerings from attendees. Paul made a motion that the money be used to offset Homecoming expenses. Lynda seconded the motion. The motion passed. Anne will send thank you notes. Lynda volunteered to arrange for moving the picnic tables from the driveway to the grassy area.
- Secure the building and make sure the lights are turned off on Sundays after church.
 - August = Lynda
 - September = Ivan
- The Rise Against Hunger event will take place on September 9th at Kate Collins Middle School. All those interested in participating should be at the school before the start of the event at 10am. The Social Ministry Committee will make a financial donation of \$250 to be sent to Grace Lutheran.

New Business:

- Paul praised the many people who helped to prepare for Homecoming, especially Open Circle and the ladies who worked diligently to clean the building. With that, Paul suggested that we establish a cleaning schedule going forward. He asked Anne to prepare such a schedule.
- There was discussion about naming our pavilion.

Next Council Meeting – A change of date, because Pastor Gordon and Anne will be on vacation, to Tuesday, September 19th in the Fellowship Hall.

With no further business, Ivan moved to adjourn the meeting and we closed with The Lord's Prayer at 8:30 p.m.
