
Lent starts in a few weeks. Does your observance of Lent interrupt anything in your life? Traditions or events that interrupt our lives are not emphasized in the Lutheran tradition even though some may experience them. Many Christians and world religions do emphasize those events or experiences that may interrupt their life.

Anne in her past life as a Catholic said she would give up all goodies for Lent. A few months ago our Grace group was meeting with the people of Christ Tabernacle Church of God in Christ (a Pentecostal church), we brought snacks for all to enjoy. To our surprise they said they were fasting that month and would not eat them. We Lutherans felt somewhat embarrassed. Muslims celebrate Ramadan and fast for a month during the day. This is a difficult decision for some athletes.

Our Lenten theme this year is "Sing With All The Saints in Glory" It lifts up many historical figures who's faith influenced their life and/or history in significant ways. John and Charles Wesley because of their faith, started the Methodist movement. Gregory the Great a pope in the 6th century, influenced our liturgy and the calendar we use. Oscar Romero and Perpetua (she lived in the 3rd century) sacrificed their lives for their belief. Harriet Tubman and Sojourner Truth fought for the freedom of African Americans and women.

We may not have mountain top experiences or change the world around us. However, God is always with us and affirms us no matter who we are or how we share our faith.

George Herbert was an English Anglican country priest and renowned poet.

John and Charles Wesley were Anglican priests, missionaries to America, and eventual founders of the Methodist movement.



Perpetua and Felicity were early Christian martyrs who chose to die rather than forsake their faith in Jesus and their commitment to each other.

Harriet Tubman was Moses to her people, leading many enslaved people to freedom during the horror of American slavery.

Sojourner Truth was an enslaved woman in New York, sued for her freedom, then spent the rest of her life working for abolition and women's suffrage.

Gregory the Great was a sixth-century pope who is often remembered as one of the "fathers of Christian worship" because of his work revising the liturgy and making developments in church music.

Patrick was a missionary to Ireland. Called by God to carry the good news of Jesus to the Irish, he became one of the founders of the great Celtic tradition of Christianity.





Call to Order: Ivan Diehl, Vice-President, called the meeting to order.

Pastor Gordon opened the meeting with a devotion describing the backstory of baptism. Central to baptism is relationship, God with us, Emmanuel. That is what our community is about, relationships.

The **Minutes** for the December 12th Council Meeting were presented. A motion was made by Ivan and seconded by Anne to approve the minutes. The motion carried.

The **Minutes** from a combined Council/Stewardship & Finance Committee Meeting held on December 24th were shared for informational purposes (see below). No action required. The **Financial Report** for December was presented. A motion was made by Lynda and seconded by Paul to accept the report. The motion carried.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Gordon reported that he continues to make home visits and recently had some hospital visits. He discussed the Lenten service schedule and queried for input regarding midday rather than evening services, with a simple soup meal. He stated that he has reached out to the other pastors regarding midday services and is waiting for responses.

- Worship, Music, & Altar: Pastor Gordon reported that the choir has prepared a Cantata for this Sunday. He asked the Council's opinion on moving the Ash Wednesday service to noon. He will query the congregation on Sunday.
- Constitution and By-Laws Committee: No report.
